
#### Facilitator reflections on the Term 3, 2023 cohort




- Students noticeably grew in confidence over the course of the program
- Allowing students to reply in language and in written form increased engagement, particularly from quieter students
- Students were very interested in learning about the LGBTIQA+ community and Australian attitudes/legislation regarding the community
- The girls' group showed significant concern about appearance and body image that had not been a focus of previous cohorts
- Boys' group seemed less aware of gender norms than the girls' group
- Members of the girls' group expressed frustration with gender norms

#### What is FGC?

FGC stands for Female Genital Cutting or Circumcision

You may have heard it referred to as Female Genital Mutilation (FGM), however this is generally not the preferred terminology when engaging communities.

- A cultural practice that violates the human rights of women and girls
- Defined as a procedure involves partial or total removal of female genital organs, or other injury to female genital organs for nonmedical reasons
- Australia is home to increasing numbers of women from countries that practice FGC

#### What is FARREP?

- Stands for The Family and Reproductive Rights Education Program
- Victorian state-wide health promotion program
- Works with communities who have been exposed to cultural practices in their country of origin that have led to poor sexual and reproductive health outcomes
- Delivers professional development training to health professionals



#### **Program aims**

- To strengthen the knowledge in these communities about FGC and support changes to their attitudes about the practice to prevent its occurrence
- To ensure increased access to timely and appropriate sexual and reproductive health services by women and girls from communities that have migrated from countries that have prevalence of FGC through provision of appropriate health information, advocating for women with health and other services, and improving services through professional development across the western region of Victoria.
- To build the capacity, confidence, and expertise of health professionals to understand the social, cultural, and clinical needs of women and girls who have undergone FGC to improve access to culturally appropriate services in the region
- Use evidence-based health education to target communities and increase their knowledge

#### Young African Women Project



- The Young African Women's project provides sexual and reproductive health education to young African Australian women and girls
- Considers the health and safety and wellbeing and deliver in a culturally sensitive manner
- Focuses on women's health and wellbeing and include the use of culturally appropriate resources
- Facilitated by experienced FARREP health promotion coordinators
